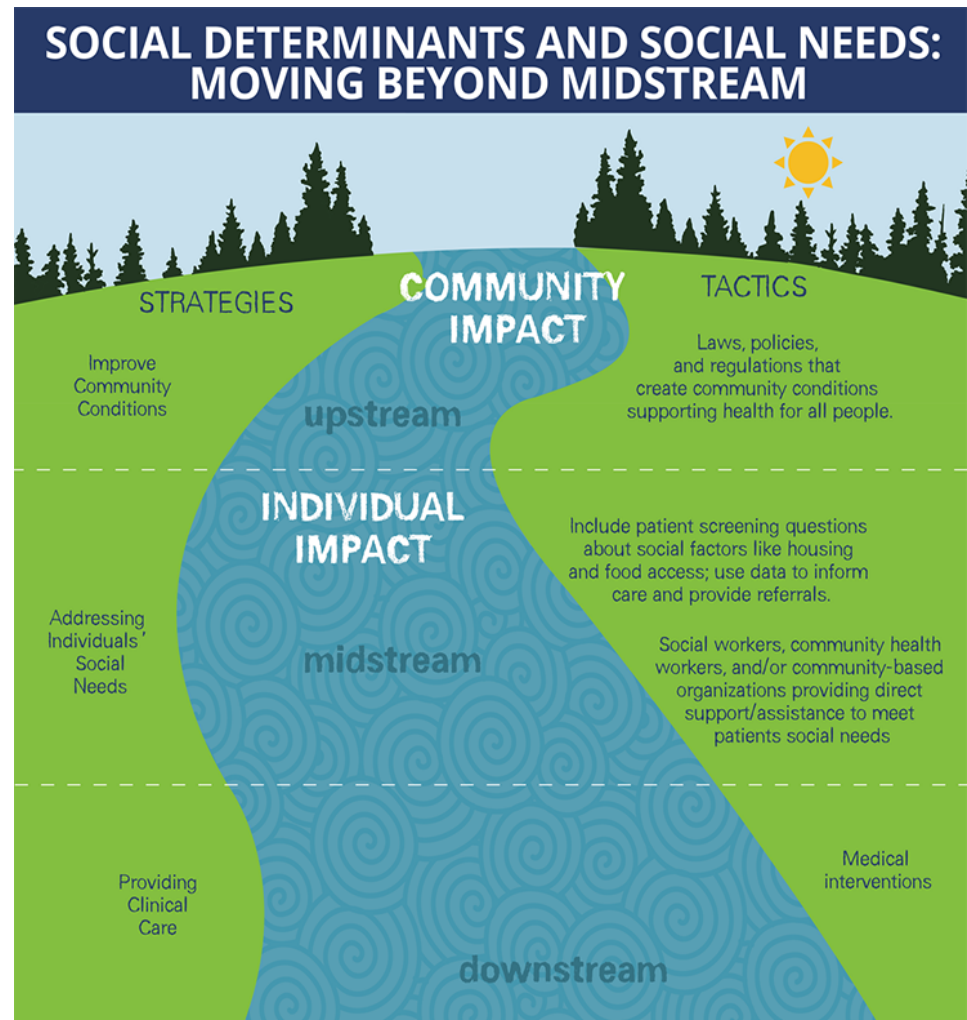

They are conditions in the places where people live, learn, work, and play that affect a wide range of health and quality-of-life risks and outcomes.



Meeting only individual social needs falls short of addressing social determinants of health



ICD-10-CM Code Categories for Social Determinants of Health

Z55 – Problems related to education and literacy

Z56 – Problems related to employment & unemployment

Z57 – Occupational exposure to risk factors

Z59 – Problems related to housing & economic circumstances

Z60 – Problems related to social environment

Z62 – Problems related to upbringing

Z63 – Other problems related to primary support group, including family circumstances

Z64 – Problems related to certain psychosocial circumstances

Z65 – Problems related to other psychosocial circumstances

Z75 – Problems related to medical facilities & other health care

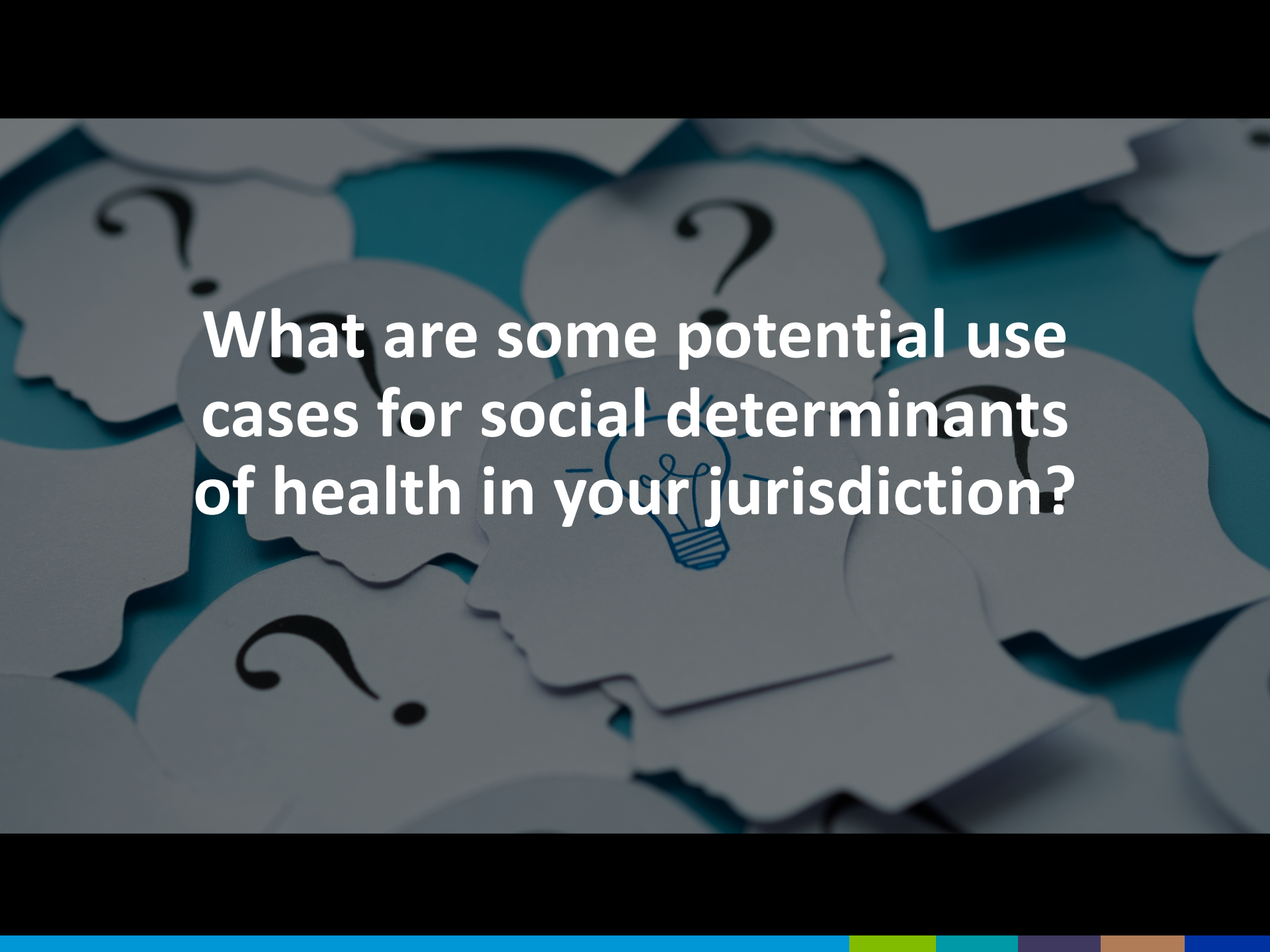

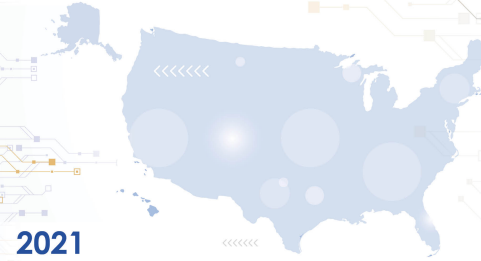
