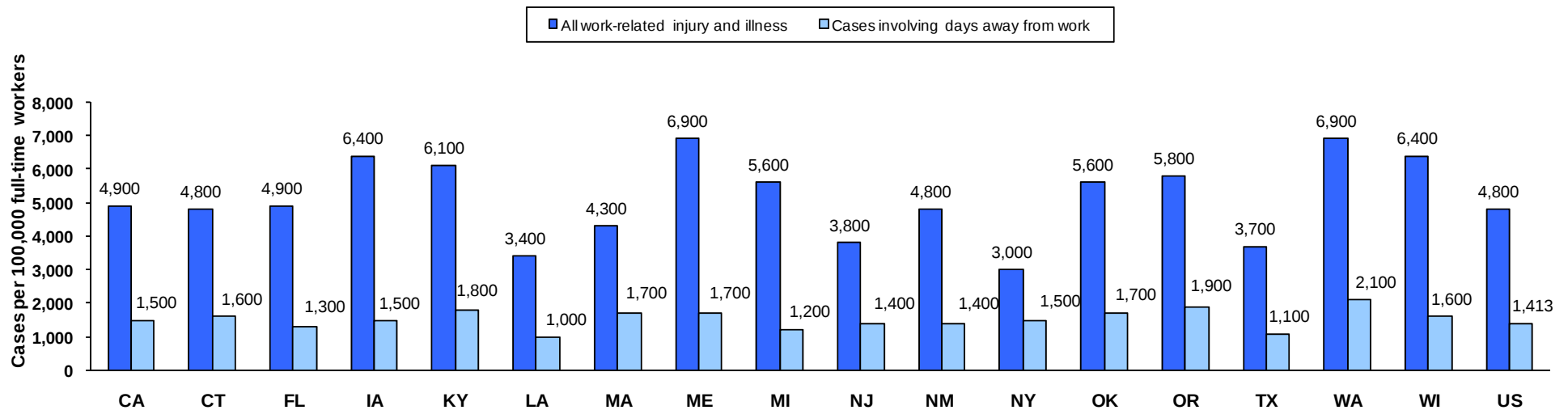

The rates published in the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) are the number of injury and illness cases per 100 FTEs. The rates presented here, which are cases per 100,000 FTEs were derived by multiplying BLS published rates by 1,000. These converted rates are not as precise as those that would be calculated from the raw Annual Survey data.
