They are used by our design team to understand more about the many different types of BioSense users. **Scenarios** are short narratives which describe an environment and an activity that takes place within it. We are developing scenarios with BioSense users so that we can explore their work activities and integrate supportive features into our application design.

Make the interface flow - Interactive user testing with our application prototype

To ensure the BioSense application is useful and intuitive to navigate, we are engaging potential BioSense users in a "think-aloud" protocol which will help us understand how the user interface can be improved to meet the preferences of our diverse user base.

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Tell us what you do - Task analysis

Task analysis is the investigation of the completion of a particular activity in the course of your job. In the BioSense Redesign Project we are using task analysis to help designers understand how BioSense users accomplish their work, so that the application can integrate seamlessly into many different professional environments.

Tell us what you think -Panel discussion

The BioSense Redesign Project is a multidisciplinary, multiple-stakeholder effort. In our panel discussion, we will bring individuals from several different areas of public health to review our progress and present the next steps through a series of brief presentations. Following the presentations, you will have the opportunity to voice your opinion and bring your unique perspective to the project.

HOW TO GET PUBLISHED IN THE MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY WEEKLY REPORT (MMWR)

CSTE, in collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), is offering a workshop on writing for the MMWR weekly series, CDC's primary vehicle for timely publication of public health information. Both the morning and afternoon sessions of this workshop will consist of didactic presentations followed by interactive learning activities conducted in smaller groups. The workshop is targeted toward junior to mid-level public health professionals with state or local health departments interested in publishing an article in the MMWR.

PUBLIC HEALTH SURVEILLANCE WORKSHOP

In recent years, several factors have significantly changed the landscape of public health surveillance, including the demands for greater public health preparedness, the rapid development of new informatics technologies, and healthcare reform with its significant emphasis on promoting the use of electronic health records for public health surveillance. The result has been increased need for rapid data collection, processing and interpretation and for greater standardization of surveillance criteria nationally. In February, CSTE convened a small group of surveillance experts to begin discussing what the roles of local, state, territorial, and federal jurisdictions should be in the conduct of public health surveillance and a strategy for optimal governance and decision making for surveillance activities. This workshop will include presentations concerning current surveillance issues and a summary of the conclusions and recommendations from the February meeting. Workshop attendees will have the opportunity to discuss and provide comments on surveillance issues and strategies for addressing them. CSTE plans to publish a white paper summarizing the findings from the February meeting and this workshop.

THOMAS R. FRIEDEN, MD, MPH

Thomas R. Frieden, M.D., M.P.H., became Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Administrator of the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR) in June 2009. Dr. Frieden has worked to control both communicable and noncommunicable diseases in the United States and around the world. From 1992-1996, he led New York City's program that rapidly controlled tuberculosis, including reducing cases of multidrug-resistant tuberculosis by 80 percent. He then worked in India for five years where he assisted with national tuberculosis control efforts. The program in India has treated more than 10 million patients and has saved more than one million lives.

As Commissioner of the New York City Health Department from 2002-2009, he directed one of the world's largest public health agencies, with an annual budget of \$1.7 billion and more than 6,000 staff. During his tenure, the number of smokers declined by 350,000, teen smoking decreased by half, and New York City became the first place in the United States to eliminate trans-fats from restaurants, rigorously monitor the diabetes epidemic, and require certain restaurants to post calorie information prominently. The Department also greatly increased colon cancer screening and eliminated racial/ethnic disparities in colon cancer screening rates. Under Dr. Frieden's leadership, the department also established the largest community electronic health records project in the country. The project provided prevention-oriented electronic health records to physicians caring for more than a million New Yorkers, including more than half of the doctors caring for patients in Harlem, the South Bronx, and Bedford-Stuyvesant. The project is a model for efforts to expand electronic health record use nationally.

Dr. Frieden also provided *pro bono* assistance to New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg in his global health philanthropy; including helping to establish the Bloomberg Initiative to Reduce Tobacco Use, a strategic program which promotes the implementation of proven interventions which can save more than 100 million lives.

A physician with training in internal medicine, infectious diseases, public health, and epidemiology, Dr. Frieden is especially known for his expertise in tuberculosis control. Dr. Frieden previously worked for CDC from 1990 until 2002. He began his career at CDC as an Epidemiologic Intelligence Service (EIS) Officer at the New York City Health Department.

Dr. Frieden speaks Spanish and graduated from Oberlin College. He received both his medical degree and master's of public health degree from Columbia University and completed infectious disease training at Yale University. He has received numerous awards and honors and has published more than 200 scientific articles.



FARZAD MOSTASHARI, MD, SCM

Farzad Mostashari, MD, ScM serves as Deputy National Coordinator for Programs and Policy within the Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Previously, he served at the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene as Assistant Commissioner for the Primary Care Information Project, where he facilitated the adoption of prevention-oriented health information technology by over 1,500 providers in underserved communities. Dr. Mostashari also led the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) funded NYC Center of Excellence in Public Health Informatics and an Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality funded project focused on quality measurement at the point of care. Prior to this he established the Bureau of Epidemiology Services at the NYC Department of Health, charged with providing epidemiologic and statistical expertise and data for decision making to the health department.

He did his graduate training at the Harvard School of Public Health and Yale Medical School, internal medicine residency at Massachusetts General Hospital, and completed the CDC's Epidemic Intelligence Service. He was one of the lead investigators in the outbreaks of West Nile Virus and anthrax in New York City, and among the first developers of real-time electronic disease surveillance systems nationwide.



KANA ENOMOTO, MA

Ms. Enomoto serves as the Director of the Office of Policy, Planning, and Innovation in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. In this capacity, she provides leadership and coordination of strategic planning and provides an integrated and structured approach to program policy analysis, coordination, development and communication. She also serves as SAMHSA's Associate Administrator for Women's Services and Chair of the Advisory Committee on Women's Services.

Ms. Enomoto has been the Principal Senior Advisor to the Administrator and coordinated Agency activities on behalf of the Administrator across the full spectrum of mental health and substance abuse policy issues, SAMHSA's grant and contracts portfolio, human capital management, process improvement, and interagency/intersectoral collaborations. Prior to joining the Office of the Administrator, Ms. Enomoto worked in SAMHSA's Center for Mental Health Services where she played key roles in the development of seminal behavioral health policy documents such as *Transforming Mental Health Care in America: The Federal Action Agenda* and *The President's New Freedom*

Commission on Mental Health Final Report and the Surgeon General's Supplemental Report on Mental Health: Culture, Race and Ethnicity. She also was a lead evaluator on the \$40 million SAMHSA Multi-Site Study on Women, Co-occurring Disorders, and Violence.

Since coming to HHS as a Presidential Management Intern (Fellow) in 1998, Ms. Enomoto has worked to raise the profile of women's and minorities' mental health and substance abuse issues at the federal level. Prior to entering the federal government, she was a research associate at the National Research Center on Asian American Mental Health at the University of California, Los Angeles. Ms. Enomoto's background is in clinical psychology and she received her bachelors and masters degrees from UCLA.

MARCELLE LAYTON, MD

Marcelle C. Layton, MD, is the Assistant Commissioner for the Bureau of Communicable Disease at the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. She received her medical degree at Duke University and completed residency training in internal medicine at State University of New York Health Sciences Center in Syracuse, NY. She has also completed fellowship training in infectious disease at Yale University School of Medicine and was an Epidemic Intelligence Service officer with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Dr. Layton has participated as a member in the Institute of Medicine's (IOM) Forum on Emerging Infections; the University of Pittsburgh's Center for Civilian Biosecurity (which was formerly at Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health); the Executive Session on Domestic Preparedness of John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University; the IOM Committee on Effectiveness of National Biosurveillance Systems: Biowatch and the Public Health System; the H1N1 Subcommittee to the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the CDC's Board of Scientific Counselors. She is a frequent lecturer at local, national and international conferences on topics related to bioterrorism and pandemic preparedness, as well as a range of emerging infectious disease issues.

Dr. Layton played a key role in New York City's public health response to the appearance of West Nile virus in 1999 and following the attacks on the World Trade Center and intentional anthrax release in 2001, and most recently led the surveillance response to the emergence of the 2009 pandemic influenza H1N1 outbreak. Dr. Layton has been recognized for her outstanding contributions to public health and has been the recipient of the 1999 Public Health Association of New York City Special Merit Award, the 2000 Sloan Public Service Award and the 2002 Pumphandle Award from the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists.



JAMES M. GALLOWAY, MD, FACC, FACP, FAHA

RADM James Galloway was appointed to the position of RHA in March, 2007 by the Assistant Secretary of Health (ASH) and is the principal federal public health official and the senior USPHS officer for Region V. He also serves as the Senior Federal Official for Health for Pandemic Influenza and Bioterrorism for DHS Region C (DHHS Regions V and VI).

Dr. Galloway has been deployed to work with Admiral Thad Allen, Deepwater Horizon Incident Commander as the HHS Senior Health Official for the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill and the HHS Secretary's representative to the National Incident Command where he serves as the government-wide coordinator of the health issues related to the response under the Assistant Secretary of Preparedness and Response.

Prior to his appointment as RHA, Dr. Galloway was assigned to the University of Arizona and served as Director of the Native American Cardiology Program. Before coming to Chicago, Dr. Galloway organized and provided direct cardiac care to Native Americans in Arizona, Nevada, Utah, California and New Mexico. He was the senior cardiologist nationally for the Indian Health Service and the director of the National Native American Cardiovascular Disease Prevention Program.

Dr. Galloway received his medical degree from the Medical College of Virginia and completed his residency at the University of Vermont. He is board-certified in both internal medicine and cardiology; a fellow of the American College of Physicians, the American College of Chest Surgeons, the American College of Cardiology and the American Heart Association. Dr. Galloway has published over 170 articles, abstracts, book chapters and one book, "Primary Care of Native American Patients: Diagnosis, Therapy and Epidemiology." He has received numerous awards, including being named the Outstanding Clinician for the Indian Health Service nationally in 1997 and has been twice awarded the Secretary of Health and Human Services Award for Distinguished Service. He has been awarded several Public Health Service medals, including the Commendation Medal.

Dr. Galloway was selected by U.S. Surgeon General as the Governor for the American College of Cardiology to represent the United States Public Health Service and was subsequently elected as the FACC Governor for Arizona. Dr. Galloway works with the American College of Cardiology in its efforts with the American Diabetes Association in the "Make The Link" Program, an educational and public health approach focusing on the link between diabetes and heart disease. For this work, Dr. Galloway received the national American Diabetes Association's C. Everett Kook Award for Health Promotion and Awareness on behalf of the American College of Cardiology.



CHARLES W. HOGE, MD, COLONEL, U.S. ARMY (RET.)

Charles Hoge is a nationally-known expert on PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder), mTBI (mild traumatic brain injury) and other physiological reactions to war, as well as treatment strategies for war-related conditions. Dr. Hoge's expertise spans psychiatry, trauma, public health, health policy, and infectious diseases. His articles in *The New England Journal of Medicine* and *The Journal of the American Medical Association* are the most frequently cited medical articles about the impact of the current wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

From 2002 through 2009, Dr. Hoge directed the top U.S. research program at Walter Reed Army Institute of Research on the psychological and neurological consequences of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. He served as an attending psychiatrist at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center, providing treatment to warriors and family members. He deployed to Iraq in 2004 and traveled throughout the country to improve combat stress care in the field. DONALD S. BURKE, MD

Donald S. Burke, M.D., dean of the University of Pittsburgh Graduate School of Public Health (GSPH), is one of the world's foremost experts in prevention, diagnosis and control of infectious diseases of global concern, including HIV/AIDS, hepatitis A, avian influenza and emerging infectious diseases.

In addition to serving as dean of GSPH, Dr. Burke is director of the University of Pittsburgh Center for Vaccine Research and serves in the newly established position of associate vice chancellor for global health, health sciences. He also is the first University of Pittsburgh Medical Center-Jonas Salk Professor of Global Health.

Before joining the University of Pittsburgh, Dr. Burke was a professor at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, where he served as associate chair of the department of international health and director of the Center for Immunization Research. He also was principal investigator of National Institutes of Health-supported research projects on HIV vaccines, biodefense and emerging infectious diseases.

Prior to his tenure at Johns Hopkins, Dr. Burke served 23 years on active duty in the U.S. Army, leading military infectious disease research at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research in Washington, D.C., and at the Armed Forces Research Institute of Medical Sciences in Bangkok, Thailand. He retired at the rank of colonel.

Dr. Burke's career-long mission has been prevention and mitigation of the impact of epidemic infectious diseases of global importance. His research activities have spanned a wide range of science "from the bench to the bush," including development of new diagnostics, population-based field studies, clinical vaccine trials, computational modeling of epidemic control strategies and policy analysis. He has authored or co-authored more than 200 research reports.



DAVID JERNIGAN, PHD

David H. Jernigan Ph.D. is an Associate Professor in the Department of Health, Behavior and Society and the Director of the Center on Alcohol Marketing and Youth at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, where he teaches courses on social and behavioral aspects of health, media advocacy, and alcohol policy. He has worked as an adviser to the World Health Organization and the World Bank, and was principal author of WHO's first *Global Status Report on Alcohol* and *Global Status Report on Alcohol and Youth*, and co-authored *Media Advocacy and Public Health: Power for Prevention*, and *Alcohol in the Developing World: A Public Health Perspective*.



DENISE KOO, MD, MPH

Denise Koo, MD, MPH is Director, Scientific Education and Professional Development Program Office, CDC. The Scientific Education and Professional Development Program Office houses several key CDC training and workforce development programs with a total of nearly 400 trainees each year, including the Epidemic Intelligence Service, an ACGME-accredited Preventive Medicine Residency, the Public Health Informatics Fellowship, the Prevention Effectiveness Fellowship, and electives and fellowships for medical and veterinary students. Dr. Koo was graduated from Harvard University with a BA in Biochemical Sciences. After medical school at the University of California, San

Francisco, and an MPH in epidemiology at University of California, Berkeley, she completed a primary care internal medicine residency at the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. She is a graduate of CDC's Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS) and Preventive Medicine Residency. Her career path at CDC has included positions overseeing operation of the National Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System, and as Director of the Division of Public Health Surveillance and Informatics, in the Epidemiology Program Office (EPO).



STEPHANIE ZAZA, MD, MPH, FACPM

Director, Epidemiology and Analysis Program Office, Office of Surveillance, Epidemiology, and Laboratory Services, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Stephanie Zaza serves as the Director, Epidemiology and Analysis Program Office (EAPO), Office of Surveillance, Epidemiology, and Laboratory Services (OSELS), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). EAPO will assure the targeted application of public health sciences to improve population health through research, consultation, practice, training, education, technical assistance, development and

dissemination of scientific and public health information.

Dr. Zaza came to CDC in 1991 as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer. She has since developed and led high profile programs at CDC including the *Guide to Community Preventive Services* and the Steps to a HealthierUS Program. From 2006-2010, Dr. Zaza led preparedness strategy, planning, policy and communications for CDC's emergency preparedness and response activities. In 2009, she developed and led the Community Mitigation Task Force as part of CDC's response to the novel 2009 H1N1 influenza pandemic.
