

The CDC/CSTE Fellow will have the opportunity to examine emerging diseases, perform surveillance activities, and assist with health education within various programs of the Iowa Department of Public Health. The fellow's primary responsibility would be to improve both the quantity and quality of surveillance data reported to IDPH. Also possible are investigating the human health effects of concentrated animal farming industries, obesity, smoking, and pesticide and heavy metal exposures. The fellow would make professional presentations throughout the state; and develop training and educational materials for public health agencies, health care providers, and the public on a variety of health topics. IDPH anticipates that the fellow would assist in any acute outbreak investigations. IDPH would also train the fellow in bioterrorism preparedness and response.

The Iowa Department of Health envisions that the fellow would also serve in the Pesticide Surveillance Program. Iowa is a largely agricultural state and over 40,000 people are licensed to use apply restricted-use pesticides; therefore it is imperative that Iowa have a reliable and accurate reporting system for all pesticide exposures and poisonings.

The fellow will also have the opportunity to work on the Comprehensive Assessment of Rural Health in Iowa (CARHI) Project. This project is being implemented with the CDC. CARHI is a pilot surveillance program that gathers health data from a selected rural community. The project includes the collection of data on selected health indicators for all residents. The CARHI project will be instrumental in Iowa developing a statewide health tracking system.

Opportunities for working on interdisciplinary teams are abundant at IDPH. The fellow would collaborate with: the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, the Iowa Statewide Poison Control Center, the Iowa Center for Agricultural Safety and Health, local health departments, hospitals and clinics throughout Iowa, university extension services, and other divisions within IDPH.
