EOC - Domestic emergency response for Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS)

Assisted Quarantine Team in planning airplane transmission study and improving design of questionnaire for this study. Subsequently assigned to State Epi Team as assistant State Team leader. Main responsibility: maintain daily line list of domestic cases for the Daily Report Team. Participated in determining case entry into line list and assigning US CDC SARS classification. Also fielded questions from states.

West Nile Virus (WNV) fever study

During the 2002 US WNV epidemic, a high concentration of cases was identified around the region of New Orleans. Participated in administering WNV Fever Study in the area of Slidell, New Orleans suburb; study targeted patients presenting to emergency departments or clinics with fever without a source to identify early WNV cases and increase chances of isolating virus in culture. ~200 patients enrolled in study; 5% had positive WNV IgM antibody within first two weeks of symptom onset.

Vancomycin-resistant *S. aureus* Infection – Pennsylvania, 2002

Vancomycin-resistant *S. aureus* (VRSA) was isolated among other organisms from culture of infected, chronic heel ulcer in 70-year-old morbidly obese man with associated bone infection. Launched extensive nasal carriage study among case-patient's contacts and an environmental survey. Reviewed recommendations for infection control with all involved health care agencies. Received Unit Commendation from Commissioned Corps for duties related to assignment.

Investigation of community-associated methicillin resistant *S. aureus* (CA-MRSA) skin and soft tissue infections – Hawaii, 2003

Supervised first year EIS officer in investigation of CA-MRSA infections to determine whether incidence and prevalence of CA-MRSA infections increasing among Pacific Islanders compared to non-Pacific Islanders. Established liaisons through HDOH with local hospitals and physicians. Performed chart abstractions. Represented CDC in key negotiations with local physicians.

Invasive group A streptococcal infections among residents of a nursing home – Nevada, 2003

Group A streptococcus (GAS) was linked to a cluster of deaths and hospitalizations in nursing home residents. Supervised and assisted first year EIS officer in field investigation to determine index case(s) and cause and extent of the outbreak. Established liaisons with NV health department and other key personnel at the local hospital and affected nursing home. Designed and administered nursing home employee questionnaire, collected samples as needed, performed interviews and chart reviews, and discussed merits of case-control vs. cohort study to facilitate investigation.

Evaluation of the impact of pneumococcal conjugate vaccine on penicillin and trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole nonsusceptible *Streptococcus pneumoniae* in Anchorage, AK

Prospective pneumococcal nasopharyngeal carriage study of Anchorage, AK children, 3 to 59 months old. Analyzed characteristics of pneumococcal carriage before and after widespread introduction of a heptavalent conjugated pneumococcal vaccine. Data on antimicrobial resistance collected through sequential nasopharyngeal carriage studies during the winters of 2000-2004 and analyzed using SAS program.

Clinicians' management approach to children with pharyngitis

One-time survey of randomly-selected 1000 pediatricians and 1000 family physicians. Administered mailed survey to primary care practitioners to evaluate current diagnostic and treatment approaches to children with acute pharyngitis. Coordinated with multiple collaborators to launch study from February 2004 to July 15, 2004. Data analyzed using SAS.

Breakthrough pneumococcal infections in children vaccinated with pneumococcal conjugate vaccine

Prospective collection from October 2001-February 2004 of case reports (including demographic, clinical, and laboratory data) and pneumococcal isolates from breakthrough pneumococcal infections in children <5 years old, who previously received the pneumococcal conjugate vaccine. Used SAS to analyze data to determine invasive isolate serotypes, determine any contributing host conditions, and monitor for ineffective vaccine lots.

Analysis of bacterial meningitis in the United States in the post-pneumococcal conjugate vaccine era

Retrospective review and analysis of data from the Active Bacterial Core (ABC) Surveillance system. ABCs (and FoodNet for listeriosis) data from 1996-2003 examined and analyzed using SAS to determine whether trends in bacterial meningitis have been affected by public health interventions.
