#### Summary of Relevant Experience in HIV/AIDS Surveillance & Epidemiology Support for Public Health

**Interventions:** From 10/1998 through 11/2003, served for 5 years as *HIV/AIDS Section Leader/State HIV/AIDS Epidemiologist* and Principal Investigator of PA's statewide HIV case surveillance, incidence and viral resistance, enhanced perinatal exposure and other related Epidemiologic studies, with responsibility for surveillance & related study protocol development and procurement of multi-project cooperative grants from CDC (and HRSA). Started with initial staff complement of 6 in 1998 doubling to 12 by 2004 (grants doubled to >\$1 Million). Collaborated with HIV/AIDS and related infectious disease Epidemiology staff, Bureau and Executive staff to review and develop recommendations for revisions to statewide HIV/AIDS and related communicable disease reporting policy, regulations and procedures, as necessary. Implemented PA's Disease Reporting Act (incl. authoring a proposal/brief leading to the 2002 revision of HIV and related diseases reporting regulations) and directed prompt reporting of HIV, 23 AIDS-defining illnesses, CD4 T-lymphocyte counts < 200 cells/uL (or 14%), and perinatal exposure to HIV. Collaborated with CDC to direct and provide Epidemiologic expertise to a statewide public health network of over 300 state/municipal staff and over 450 hospitals, physicians and laboratories in the development, implementation, and evaluation of a state-of-the-art HIV/AIDS and related disease surveillance. In collaboration with CDC, developed and/or directed special epidemiologic/surveillance studies investigating HIV/AIDS modes of transmission/risk behaviors, etiology, transmission sources, perinatal exposure, incidence, and viral resistance; and investigating appropriate disease intervention strategies and methods for disease prevention and control. For 10 continuous years since 1996 (in NYC and PA), also provided HIV Epidemiology support for public health intervention programs including collaborating in development of HIV (and related disease) applied Epidemiology research and intervention program plans, policies, procedures, implementation and evaluation in the capacity of principal Epidemiology consultant supporting statewide HIV prevention & care planning and cooperative grant applications from CDC and HRSA (current PA grants supported >\$40 million).

Directed and collaborated in data analyses (using SAS, SPSS, EpiInfo-EpiMap and HARS-PRODAS), interpretation and timely preparation of HIV/AIDS and related disease data summaries: Quarterly and Biannual Summaries, Integrated Epidemiologic Profiles of HIV/AIDS in PA, quarterly reports to the Division of Infectious Disease Epidemiology (IDE), articles/presentations for lay and professional audiences and peer-review. Planned, coordinated, assigned and determined work priorities, set goals, reviewed and prepared employee work performance evaluations of subordinates. Reviewed, evaluated, recommended, and conducted epidemiology and other training of subordinates, and field personnel through the Department's Public Health Institute. Established the Applied HIV Epidemiology Training Program to offer a) a basic HIV Epidemiology track at the PA Department of Health's Public Health Institute (PHI), and b) advanced HIV Epidemiology training in collaboration with the CDC-CSTE-ASPH Applied Epidemiology Fellowship program. Delivered public health educational presentations to selected audiences and provided HIV, related communicable disease epidemiology and public health consultative services, using published national standards of excellence and practice to Department programs, Districts, County/Municipal Health Departments, and other state agencies. Member of Department of Health IRB since 1999, with special interest in ethical implications of Epidemiologic study designs.
